

PREFACE

Government College of Education has been rendering exemplary service in the field of teacher education for the past 59 years since its inception in 1956. This College has been fulfilling the aspirations of the meritorious but economically backward students belonging to rural areas. The College has the reputation of laving been visited by the former President of India. Dr. S Radhakrishnan and the former Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu Thiru K. Kamaraj. The alumni of the college serve in various schools, colleges and the Department of Education of the State of Tamil Nadu.

The college was started in 1956 with the purpose of promoting women's education in the independent India. In the presence of the former Education Minister of Tamil Nadu Mr.C.Subramaniam, the Central Minister of Industry and Commerce Mr.T.T. Krishnamachari inaugurated this college. Initially there were 75 students and 7 teacher-educators. In the beginning the college was affiliated to the University of Madras. The first Principal was Mrs. N. Shanmugasundram. M.Ed. (part-time) programme was started in 1973 but it was stopped from the year 2000 following the instructions received from NCTE. M.Phil. (Part-time) and Ph.D. (part-time) were started in 1993. In 2009-10 M.Ed. (full time) programme was started with the recognition of NCTE. From 1982 to June 2007 the College functioned with affiliation to Bharathiar University. However, from July 2008 the college has been affiliated to Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University, Chennai.

In the year 2011 four posts have been sanctioned by the Government of Tamil Nadu exclusively for the M.Ed programme. The College underwent NAAC assessment in the academic years 2001-2002 and 2007-2008. This is the third cycle of assessment.

IQAC has been functioning from the year 2005. Every year several IQAC meetings are conducted to look into the challenges faced by the College and to plan activities to improve the functioning of the College. When it was decided to subject ourselves to the third cycle of assessment and accreditation, all the members of the faculty were apprised of the tasks involved in the process. Work was allotted to the individual faculty members by Dr.E.Vijaya, who is the IQAC Co-ordinator. The faculty members collected the data of the past five years of the college and diligently compiled them. The principal, the faculty and the non-teaching staff have all contributed to the compilation of the data and the preparation of the Self-Study Report.

The faculty members of Government College of Education for Women look forward to the inspiring exchange of ideas with the NAAC peer team. We sincerely believe that excelling one's own performance is the only way to improvement. All the stakeholders eagerly await the outcome of the third cycle of the accreditation process.

A BRIEF NOTE ON TEACHER EDUCATION SCENARIO IN THE STATE - RULES, REGULATIONS AND POLICIES

Tamil Nadu is one of the fast developing states of India in terms of quality in school, college and university education. It also pays attention to the quality in teacher education programmes for teachers at elementary, secondary and higher secondary levels.

There are government, government-aided and private colleges of education in the state. They all come under the purview of the Directorate of Collegiate Education, Tamil Nadu. Some are autonomous and the rest are governed by the syllabus and rules laid down by the Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University.

The Government of Tamil Nadu enacted Act No.(33) of 2008 to provide for the establishment of Teachers Education University in the State of Tamil Nadu for promoting excellence in teacher education. Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University is an exclusive university for teacher education established by the Government of Tamil Nadu. More than 600 Teacher Education Colleges are affiliated to this university.

The various objectives of the University are to provide high quality teacher education programmes; to monitor Teacher Education Programmes as approved by National Council for Teacher Education at all levels in the State; to develop research facilities in Teacher Education; to find out ways and means to identify innovative courses in Teacher Education; to institute degrees and other academic distinctions in Teacher Education approved by NCTE; to confer degrees and other academic distinctions on persons who have carried out research in University or in any other centre or institutions recognized by the University under conditions prescribed for Teacher Education; to

confer honorary degrees in teacher education in the prescribed manner and under conditions prescribed; to conduct and organize seminars, workshops and symposia in promoting Teacher Education with a view to offering programs in the latest field and to develop the extension activities. The University is very much focused to promote quality in Education and to standardize the system of operation.

The state aspires to have state of the art facilities for teacher education institutions. There is no dearth in quantity as far as the number of institutions is concerned. However, the budding teachers are to be shaped to meet the global challenges and the local needs. It is hoped that excellence in teacher education is possible with NCTE's new set of regulations in place and the positive role of Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Government College of Education for Women, situated in the heart of the city of Coimbatore, is one of the pioneer institutions in the state of Tamil Nadu offering teacher education programmes. The College was started in 1956 during the Second Five Year Plan period when the need for trained teachers was felt in the wake of school education becoming compulsory. It was established to prepare young graduates to take up teaching profession. The alumni of this College are serving as CEOs, college principals, college lecturers, school head-mistresses, high school and higher secondary school teachers throughout the state of Tamil Nadu and outside the state.

The College was inaugurated on 08.08.1956 by the then Central Minister for Industry and Commerce Mr. T.T. Krishnamachari. The college, which started functioning with 75 students and 7 teacher-educators, enjoys 2(F) and 12(B) status. Formerly known as Government Training College, the College was upgraded to the status of College of Teacher Education in 1995 and from 1997 onwards it has come under the purview of NCTE. M.Ed. Degree (Evening Course) was started in 1973 for the benefit of teachers-inservice. The course was stopped on the orders of the NCTE as the relevant rules and regulations had not been framed by NCTE for evening college programmes. However, M.Ed. (regular) programme was started in 2009-2010 after obtaining recognition from NCTE. From 1993 the College has been offering M.Phil, and Ph.D. research programmes.

The College has been affiliated to Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University, Chennai from July 2009.

The College was accredited with B+ status by NAAC in 2002. In 2008, the college went for the second cycle of accreditation and was given 'B' grade by NAAC with 2.68 points. There are 125 students in B.Ed. and 35 students in M.Ed.

Vision and Mission of the college

Our vision is

"To transform graduates into competent, dedicated and sincere teachers who will serve the student community with love and truthfulness".

The above stated vision is targeted to produce student-teachers who are academically sound, well-trained, dedicated and determined to serve the community and nation at large. Thus, with our mission we act with the spirit of dedication and commitment to build a value - based, productive and patriotic society.

Our mission is

- To create an awareness among the students about the challenges in global educational scenario, psychology of students and teaching methodologies.
- To equip the students with knowledge of education technology, evaluation methods and innovative teaching-learning procedures.
- To make the future teachers acquire the competencies necessary to meet the global standards.
- To inculcate right value systems among the future teachers so that they become responsive to the changing needs of the society and the environment.

Curricular Aspects

The college remains affiliated to Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University, Chennai. The syllabus is framed by the University Board of Studies and revised from time to time. The academic calendar is provided by the University outlining the important stages in the curriculum transaction for both B.Ed. and M.Ed. Programmes. The curriculum strictly follows NCTE guidelines. One of our faculty is a member of the Academic Council of the TNTEU, Chennai.

The curriculum for both B.Ed. and M.Ed. are transacted through regular classes, seminars, group learning activities, and assignments. Bridge course in conducted to the newly-inducted students. Technology is incorporated into classroom teaching in all possible ways.

Practicum components are well taken care of B.Ed. students go for Practice Teaching for 40 working days in Government and Corporation schools. M.Ed. students have research component as a compulsory part in the curriculum.

Cultural events and competitions in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are conducted and prizes are distributed to the students. They are also encouraged to participate in competitions conducted by other institutions. The College brings out a magazine every year to nurture the creative talent of the students. They are also encouraged to participate is sports events conducted inside the campus and outside the College.

Seminars and symposia are conducted for the students. Faculty and students are encouraged to attend seminars / conferences / workshops and to present / publish papers.

Remedial teaching programmes, TET / TRB Coaching classes and Communicative

English classes are also conducted for the benefit of the students. Short-term courses are also conducted to enrich the curriculum.

Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

Proper planning is in place to see that all academic programmes are conducted as per schedule. Feedback mechanism is at work to supervise the practice teaching of the student-teachers. During micro-teaching peers' evaluation and teacher-educators' evaluation help the student-teachers to see their own teaching from the right perspective so that corrections are possible.

Language lab and Communicative English classes put the students on the right track to improve their fluency and accuracy in English. The faculty and the students enjoy Wi-Fi connectivity. The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled. There are 10 internet connections at subsidized rates provided by NMEICT – BSNL.

Whenever vacancies arise guest faculty are appointed after obtaining sanction from the Government of Tamil Nadu so that students do not suffer. Quite a number of students clear TET and TRB examinations after completing B.Ed. or M.Ed. The faculty improve themselves by attending seminars / workshops / conferences at State level, national level and international level. Every year a few B.Ed./ M.Ed. students clear NET / SLET examinations. Many of our students get posted in government and government-aided schools.

The College has a well-stacked library with more than 22000 books and 10 journals. The college subscribes to INFLIBNET. Internet facility and reprographic facilities are available in the library. CD-ROMs and Braille books are also made available

to the visually-challenged students. Voice recorders are available for the visually-challenged students to enable them to listen to the content / lessons later.

The College has been consistent in achieving nearly 100% results in the past 15 years in both B.Ed and M.Ed. Almost all the students secure first class.

Students' teaching is reviewed by peers and the teacher-educators during microteaching. While in school, they are supervised by both guide teachers and teacher -educators.

The performance of teacher-educators is subject to self-examination after obtaining student-feedback.

Teachers teach in technology-rich environment. For example, there are LCD projectors in seven classrooms and interactive boards in 3 classrooms. Students are also trained in the use of these technically advanced teaching aids for classroom teaching.

Research, Consultancy and Extension

Out of the eight faculty members 4 have obtained Ph.D. degrees. All the faculty in the college have obtained the entire faculty has M.Phil. degrees. Two of them are pursuing Ph.D. at present. All M.Ed. students have the research component. Three faculty members have applied for UGC grant to do minor research projects. During 2013-2014 academic year four faculty of this college have completed minor research projects under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme of the Government of India.

The faculty acts as resource persons in other institutions. Faculty Development Programmes for the engineering faculty are conducted by one of our faculty members. Our faculty members have presented papers at state, national and international level seminars and conferences. They have also published articles in international and national journals.

There is a Placement Cell to help students get employment. We have Youth Red Cross and Red Ribbon Club to enable students to participate in useful extension activities. Our students handle extra-classes for the educationally backward students in schools after school hours.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The whole campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Computer Lab, Language Lab, Physical Science Lab, Psychology Lab all contribute to learning. There is a well-equipped digital library with over 22000 books and internet facility. Teaching aids and technological devices such as smart boards and LCD projectors are available. CCTV cameras are fixed at various places to ensure the safety of the women students. There are adequate classrooms, auditorium, seminar hall, multi-purpose hall, labs and separate toilets for men and women. There is parking facility and a canteen is there to provide food and nourishment to the inmates. Furniture is adequate in both College and Hostel.

Student Support Services

Students are selected on the basis of merit and reservation policy of the government to ensure equity. They are helped to obtain scholarships and loans from government sources. Visually-challenged students are helped to receive funds and aid from NGOs.

Hostel facilities are available inside the campus. Students from distant places stay comfortably in the hostel. Clean water and safe drinking water, mess facility and internet facility are available to the hostel students. A matron has been appointed to take care of the students. Medical help is made available to the hostel inmates.

Students are helped to prepare lessons with multimedia features. Remedial Programmes, TET / TRB coaching classes and communicative English classes are conducted for the benefit of the students. For the new entrants to the B.Ed programme a bridge course is conducted for two days. Campus interview is arranged and about 20 schools regularly participate during the event. Even after the campus interview students are informed about job vacancies in schools / colleges.

Hostel facilities hot water is provided through solar water heating systems in the hostel as Coimbatore enjoys cool climate for many months in a year.

Students are sent to other colleges to participate in co-curricular and extra curricular activities. Teachers encourage students to participate in seminars and present papers. Students are given travel allowance to participate in competitions.

Old Students Association extends financial support for various activities. Parent-Teachers Association also supports the activities in the College.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Principal, the staff-council and various committees govern the institution well. The faculty and the other staff work in co-ordination with the IQAC Co-ordinator, Examination-in-charge, Union-in Change and the Placement Officer. Academic calendar is prepared in the College Council Meeting and all decisions pertaining to academic matters are taken in the Staff Council Meeting. Dissemination of information is done through the office automation.

Library is automated. The welfare of the staff, students and the faculty is well taken care of. There is flexibility transparency, and democracy in the planning and execution of academic matters. The hostel is run by the Warden / Principal. The accounts are audited by

the Joint Director of Collegiate Education, office of the District Collector and the Accountant General.

Innovations and Best Practices


The college is a pioneer in setting up solar water heaters and an incinerator in the hostel. To make the environment eco-friendly, solar lamps have been installed. Surveillance cameras and CCTV have been installed for the safety of the women students.

Students have been apprised of the web-tools such as E-resources and E-content to enhance their teaching and learning. They are encouraged to prepare lessons and upload them on YouTube.

The Principal / Warden and Mess-Committee members regularly taste the hostel food and give feedback to the mess contractor on the quality of the food. It is ensured that the ingredients are sourced from the right places to provide quality food to the hostel inmates.

In-service training programmes are conducted to serving teachers. For example in the year 2012, under the aegis of the Centrally-Sponsored Scheme 448 higher secondary school teachers were invited from 7 districts of Tamil Nadu and they were given three-day training programmes in various school subjects. The college extends this kind of exemplary service to the serving teachers in addition to moulding pre-service graduates into skilled teachers.

Continuous assessment is made with an effective system to prepare question papers for internal assessment tests and model examination. M.Ed. Students are properly guided to select topics for their research. Out of three topics given by the students, the university selects one topic for their dissertation work. Students are encouraged to do research using less explored methods such as experimental research and case study.



1. Our Vision

Our vision is, "To transform graduates into competent, dedicated and sincere teachers who will serve the student community with love and truthfulness".

The above stated vision is targeted to produce student-teachers who are academically sound, well-trained, dedicated and determined to serve the community and nation at large. Thus, with our mission we act with the spirit of dedication and commitment to build a value - based, productive and patriotic society.

2. Our Mission

Our mission is

- To create an awareness among the students about the challenges in global educational scenario, psychology of students and teaching methodologies.
- To equip the students with knowledge of education technology, evaluation methods and innovative teaching-learning procedures.

- To make the future teachers acquire the competencies necessary to meet the global standards.
- To inculcate right value systems among the future teachers so that they become responsive to the changing needs of the society and the environment.

3. Our main objectives are:

- To make the student-teachers imbibe the spirit of teaching and learning to commit themselves as dedicated teachers of tomorrow.
- To build a world of tolerance and solidarity, where discrimination is done away with and the needs of all are respected and fulfilled.
- To enable the student-teachers to find suitable placement in schools and colleges.
- To achieve excellence in education through various activities, thereby developing personal as well as professional values among the student teachers.
- To inculcate the spirit of leadership qualities, devotion, discipline and noble values of politeness, respect, tolerance and to impart the ideals of honesty, solidarity, integrity and boldness among the student-teachers.
- To recognize, tap and top-up the potentials of each student teachers.
- To achieve the academic excellence with an out-standing fervor for enjoying the state of intelligentsia.
- To challenge ourselves, staff and students, to strive for excellence.

To meet the global trends and demands the need-based curriculum is selected by Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University. As an affiliated college, we follow the syllabus prescribed by the University. Three core papers are taught to highlight the

- Education in the Emerging Indian Society
- ❖ Psychology of Learning and Human Development
- ❖ Educational Innovations and Curriculum Development

The elective papers deal with

- * Environmental education
- Guidance and Counseling
- Educational Administration and Management
- Physical and Health Education
- ❖ Peace and Value Education.

The optional papers explain the methodology of teaching their subjects at graduate and post-graduate level.

The academic programmes of the College are connected with the institution's vision, mission and objectives. The feedback forms on present curriculum are collected from the students, faculty, alumni and academic experts form database to formalize the decisions in

statutory academic bodies. As an Academic Council Member Dr. (Mrs). R.Indrani (Associate Professor, Dept. of English) attends the meetings of the University and takes part in the deliberations.

3. How are the global trends in teacher education reflected in the curriculum and existing courses modified to meet the emerging needs?

- To meet the global challenges, we have a core paper titled "Education in the Emerging Indian Society".
- To cope up with the children of today, we have a core paper titled "Psychology of Learning and Human Development".
- To practice and to prepare new innovative techniques and curriculum, we have a core paper titled "Educational Innovations and Curriculum Development".
- To inculcate environmental awareness, there is an elective paper titled "Environmental Education".
- To facilitate personal, professional and social adjustment, we have "Guidance and Counseling" paper.
- To keep a healthy mind in a healthy body, there is "Physical and Health Education".
- To cultivate peace and values, there is an elective paper titled "Peace and Value Education".

Thus, the student-teachers are exposed to the global trends in teacher education to meet the emerging needs in the field of education. Faculty members are encouraged to attend the various International/ National conferences, seminars, symposia, training programs, workshops, orientation and refresher programmes to know and upgrade their knowledge on the current trends. Further, they are encouraged and motivated to act as resource persons for seminars and conferences. Research methodology is included in M.Ed. Programme to inculcate the spirit of research. Elective papers on Special Education and ICT are included to meet the current demands.

4. How does the institution ensure that the curriculum bears some thrust on national issues like environment, value education and ICT?

The thrust on national issues such as environment awareness, guidance, ICT, Equitable Education is reflected in the curriculum transactions in the selected Elective Subjects such as Environmental Education, Guidance and Counseling, Physical and Health Education and Peace and Value Education. Club activities, and awareness programmes in 5-day citizenship training are organized for students to create awareness on national issues.

The College provides training in the use of Internet for education. Use of MOOCS is also demonstrated to the students and they are given hands on experience. They are encouraged to increase the use of ICT in their teaching and learning process. Teacher-educators demonstrate and justify the judicious use of appropriate technology (Interactive Board, and LCD Projectors) in handling classes. Our college faculty members are the models users of ICT, they make good use of PowerPoint presentations and online instructional resources for teaching.

Yes, the College makes use of ICT for curricular planning in the following aspects;

Thus we make use of ICT (Information and Communication Technology) in an effective way.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 How does the institution attempt to provide experiences to the students so that teaching becomes a reflective practice?

All the activities are focused towards moulding the student teachers into committed and creative teachers. The college provides practical experiences through varied practices of

microteaching, observation, teaching practice schedule wherein self-reflection and peer-review of classes also provide opportunity for reflection. Peer-review, review by guide teachers in schools and review by teacher-educators help the students to reflect on their teaching.

Every curricular and co-curricular activity of the college is planned, executed and evaluated and, thus, learning on the whole becomes a reflective practice.

1.2.2 How does the institution provide for adequate flexibility and scope in the operational curriculum for providing varied learning experiences to the students both in the campus and in the field?

A teacher, being a social scientist, has many duties and responsibilities other than teaching the subjects. Preparing such a teacher is really a challenging and an interesting task. The college has a flexible calendar to accommodate the academic events. Students have the freedom to choose their elective subjects. M.Ed. students have the freedom to work on the topic of their choice and to select samples from their locality. Curriculum offers different methods of teaching to choose from.

1.2.3 What value-added courses have been introduced by the institution during the last three years which would for example, develop communication skills (verbal & written), ICT skills, Life skills, Community orientation, Social responsibility etc..

Value-added courses

- 1. Education of Children with Special Needs.
- 2. Life skills Education.
- 3. Yoga and Meditation.

- 4. SPSS Package for M.Ed. Students.
- 5. Remedial English
- 6. English for Communication.
- 7. Enhancing Learning with web tools, such as E-resource and E-content.
- Health awareness, moral education, stress management, time management, improving self-confidence, and environmental protection have been taught to students through a bridge course for 2 weeks at the beginning of the B.Ed. programme.
- 2. Computers in education, educational technology practical classes, and Internet literacy classes are conducted to develop ICT skills. Hence, demonstration of PowerPoint presentation was taught and training was given by the faculty to B.Ed. students. Free and unlimited internet facilities are available in library and in computer lab for all students and faculty.
- 3. Psychology practicals and camp activities are efficiently conducted to develop life-skills and community orientation.
- 4. Training is also given to B.Ed. students in Handwriting, Personality Development and SUPW.
- Spoken English classes are also conducted for students to improve their linguistic skills.

1. Interdisciplinary / Multidisciplinary:

- i) Statistics is a part of the optional subject syllabus.
- ii) Psychology is a part of optional subjects in addition to being a separate core paper.
- iii) Science and Social science graduates take up Tamil or English as one of their optional subjects.
- iv) Elective papers cover a variety of subjects such as ICT in Education,
 Education of Children with Special Needs, Peace Education, Value Education,
 Education Technology, Environmental Education etc.

2. Multi - skill development:

- Students learn to submit assignments typed in computer using M.S Word.
 They also add pictures, maps, diagrams, sound files, videos into their lessons.
- ii) M. Ed., students are taught to analyze data using M.S Excel and SPSS.
- iii) Students are taught to prepare digital lesson plan using computers.
- iv) They are taught to collect information and images from the internet for using in the classroom.
- v) Communication skills and interpersonal skills are improved among the students.

3. Inclusive Education:

- i) Differentially abled students are taught along with the other students.
- ii) 3% of the total seats are allotted for physically and visually-challenged students.
- iii) Extra five seats have been allotted by the state government for the visuallychallenged students.
- iv) They are provided with voice recorders to enable them to record their lessons to learn later.
- v) Barrier free environment is provided.
- vi) Visually-challenged and physically-challenged students are allotted room on the ground floor of the hostel to facilitate easy movement.

- vii) Arrangement is made with the help of voluntary service organizations to help them write their assignments, records, tests and examinations and to make teaching aids.
- viii) Braille books are made available in the library for the benefit of the visuallychallenged students.
 - ix) Visually-challenged students receive auto fare whenever possible to reach the practicing schools.
 - x) Readers are arranged to helps them learn better.

4. Practice Teaching:

Permission is obtained from Coimbatore Corporation Educational Officer and Chief Educational Officer, Coimbatore so that students can undertake practice teaching for 40 working days in schools in and around Coimbatore city.

Before Practice Teaching:

Before the students are sent to school, micro-teaching practice is given in six skills before proceeding to link-lesson practice. During the micro-teaching sessions students are divided into groups of eight. Each student has a peer observer. Each student practices under the supervision of a teacher-educator. Feedback is given by peer-observer, teacher-educator and the other student teachers. Micro-teaching cycle is strictly observed so that student-teachers attain mastery of the individual skill.

Demonstration lessons are given by teacher educators/ subject experts. Students observe the lessons and also submit a record in which they state what they have observed. Before starting macro- teaching in schools student- teachers have the opportunity to

observe 5 lessons of their guide-teachers or senior teachers in the school. Students are asked to purchase school books in relevant subjects and they are also asked to go through the content.

Lesson plan writing:

The steps in the lesson plan writing of instructional objectives and specifications are taught to the students so that they have experience in writing the lesson plans and preparing teaching aids.

5. School experience / Internship:

Students are given training beforehand in Active Learning Methodology so that they have practical knowledge about the current teaching methods being followed in schools. Every student-teacher prepares twenty lesson plans for each optional subject.

Per day they teach a minimum of two lessons (one in each optional). The guide-teacher provides feedback after observing them. The teacher-educator also supervises them. Undergraduate students handle classes from 6th to 10th. Postgraduate students teach a class at the secondary level and a class at the higher secondary level. In addition to teaching these 40 lessons, every student-teacher gives one achievement test in each optional subject and one diagnostic test in the major subjects. Every student-teacher does a case study on one student. Question paper setting, preparation of blue print, administering the test and analysis and interpretation of scores are done by the student-teachers. In addition, they participate in all school activities.

6. Work experience / SUPW:

SUPW is an aspect of teacher preparation programme. They receive practical training in the preparation of detergent powder, phenol, file making, envelope making, glass painting, embroidery, basket making etc.

1.3 Feedback on Curriculum

1.3.1 How does the institution encourage feedback and communication from the Students, Alumni, Employers, Community, academic peers and other stakeholders with reference to the curriculum?

The College follows the syllabus of the TNTEU. The Institution offers additional components to fulfill the needs of the students. For examples:

- Awareness programmes (AIDS, Environment, Eye Donation, Women's Health, Women's Rights)
- 2. Remedial teaching
- 3. Extra coaching classes.

Feedback is obtained from student-teachers, employers, alumni and academicians in order to make improvement in the curriculum. If the students are dissatisfied they express their grievances before the Grievances Redressal Forum. The alumni visit the college and offer suggestions for the betterment of teacher-education programmes. Alumni who are running schools or heading schools visit the college to recruit teachers for the schools. They informally convey their feedback about the curriculum. Old students of the College share their experiences in the Old Students' Association meetings. Employers visit the college for selecting suitable candidates for their schools. Some of the participating schools have been visiting the college for more than fifteen years to recruit teachers. They have all expressed appreciation for the students of this college. Parents of the students also express their positive feedback about the college. Academic Council members also share their experiences and give valuable suggestions for the development in the curriculum.

All the stake holders give feedback on the curriculum formally and informally.

The modifications are carried out after discussing them in the College Council meeting.

Examples:

Changes in the college timing, medium of instruction, timing for internet browsing and number of internal tests are made after receiving feedback from the students. Academic Council of the Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University listens to views represented by the colleges and makes changes.

Yes, feedback which is received from various sources such as student-teachers, teacher-educators about the curricular activities of the institution are discussed and the changes and suggestions are analyzed for the corrective actions and the outcomes. The responsibility of implementing the corrective action is given to a particular faculty, which will be monitored by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell.

3. What are the contributions of the institution to curriculum development?

One of the faculty members is a member of the Academic Council of Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University. Opinions and suggestions of the faculty are conveyed to the Academic Council, so that necessary changes can be made by the Board of Studies.

1.4 Curriculum Update

Which courses have undergone a major curriculum revision during the last five years?

Once in three years the curricula for B.Ed. and M.Ed. programmes are completely revamped and updated. New electives have been introduced. In core subjects new additions have made. For example, in recent times, Value Education, Peace Education, and Environmental Education are given main thrust. Library and Information Science has been included as an elective paper.

M.Ed. students are required to send 3 topics to the University so that one of the topics can be selected for doing dissertation. Research is made a compulsory component of the M.Ed. programme. "Education for Children with Special Needs and Women's Education" have been introduced in M.Ed.

Practicum components have been introduced for M.Ed. students. They visit schools to observe the teaching of B.Ed. students for ten days (Field-Based Experience).

Bridge course for B.Ed. students has been introduced.

2. What are the strategies adopted by the institution for curriculum revision and update? (needs assessment, student input, feedback from practicing schools etc.)

The needs of the students are assessed by the College Council after obtaining the profile of the students. Every year feedback on curriculum is obtained from the students. Curriculum review and updates are carried out by Tamil Nadu Teacher Education University. Feedback is received from practising schools as well.

1.5 Best Practices in Curricular Aspects

B.Ed.:

- Trainees are given training in PowerPoint presentation.

- Year Plan for syllabus.
- Planned camp activities.
- Extension activities.

Title of the best practice

Providing practice in handling classes using smart class rooms.

The context that required introduction of the practice

In this technology era it is important to make the student-teachers familiar with the technologies being used in schools. There are three interactive-board-enabled classrooms in the College. As UGC has provided grants for buying equipment it is important to make use of these pieces of equipment available in the College.

Objectives of the practices

- To enable the students to use smart boards and interactive boards.
- To enable the students to face the future classrooms with confidence.
- To enable the students to use ICT.

Obstacles faced

- Finding time for providing the practice for all the students.
- Insufficient staff strength.
- There is no separate ICT faculty to train the students.

Strategies to overcome the challenges

- Methods teachers are entrusted with the task of training the students in the use of smart boards.
- Students are encouraged to make their seminar paper presentation using the smart board.
- Students are divided into the small groups for practicing the skills.

Impact of the practices

- All the student-teachers learn to use smart boards.
- They are able to use the internet while teaching.
- They become confident in the use of technology

CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Admission process and student profile:

1. Give details of the admission processes and admission policy (criteria for admission, adherence to the decisions of the regulatory bodies, equity, access, transparency etc.,) of the institution?

Publicity and transparency in admission process:

Admission for B.Ed. programme is done through single-window counselling. Lady Willingdon Institute of Advanced Study in Education, Chennai was the nodal agency which conducted the Single Window Counselling from 2007-08 to 2013-14. The principal of that college was the secretary of admissions and the guidelines were communicated as G.O. from the Higher Education Department. M.Ed. admissions were conducted by the college after calling for applications through newspapers. Admissions were made following the reservation policy and the guidelines of the Tamil Nadu government. From 2014-15 onwards admissions for both B.Ed. and M.Ed. programmes are being done by Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University, Chennai following the same guidelines. Information about admissions is given wide publicity through newspapers and the University website. Counselling is also conducted online. Details of cut-off marks are published in the University website.

Process of Admission:

Undergraduate programmes:

After the declaration of UG and PG results by all the universities in Tamil Nadu, admission procedure starts. Application forms were printed by Lady Willingdon Institute

of Advance Study in Education and sent to all parts of Tamil Nadu. The last date for applying was advertised in media and also through newspapers. After receiving filled in application forms, selection procedure starts by preparing rank list in the respective subjects as per government norms. Admission was done through SWC for all the government colleges and government aided colleges. For the year 2014-15 onwards admissions were done by the Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University, Chennai.

2. How are the programmes advertised? What information is provided to prospective students about the programs through the advertisement and prospectus or other similar material of the institution?

Programmes are advertised through newspapers and TV by the nodal agency which conducts admissions through single window system. Prospectus is issued by the nodal agency. Details of conducting admissions, desirable qualification, lists of government and aided colleges, date of admission, application fees details are given in the prospectus. These details are also available in the nodal centre's website.

3. How does the institution monitor admission decisions to ensure that the determined admission criteria are equitably applied to all applicants?

Community-wise quota system is followed by the state government and admissions are made as per the rules. Students who participate in the counselling are given the selection orders to be submitted at the respective colleges. Admission committee in the college is formed with principal as the chairman and three senior members of the faculty as its members. Certificate verification is done by all the staff members. After verification the admission committee confirms the admission, and the principal admits the students.

4. Specify the strategies if any, adopted by the institution to retain the diverse student population admitted to the institution. (e.g. individuals of diverse economic, cultural, religious, gender, linguistic, backwards and physically-challenged).

Students are admitted purely on the merit-cum-reservation policy of the government of Tamil Nadu. Physically-challenged students and religious minorities have reservation.

5. Is there a provision for assessing student's knowledge/ needs and skills before the commencement of teaching programmes? If yes, give details on the same.

Before macro-teaching takes place, student-teachers are given micro-teaching practice sessions during which when they are supervised by peer-observers and teacher-educators. In small groups micro-lessons are taught by student-teachers to peers. Student teachers are evaluated by the peer observers as well as the teacher- educators. Before the actual teaching practice commences, the students are briefed about their skills and given constructive feedback.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs

- 1. Describe how the institution works towards creating an overall environment conducive to learning and development of the students?
 - Teachers are accessible to the students. Whenever they have doubts they can approach the teachers to clarify their doubts.
 - Democratic atmosphere prevails in the classrooms/college.
 - Tutorial system is being followed and teachers take care of their wards. Their professional and personal development is taken care of by the tutors.

- Hostel facilities and good boarding facilities are provided to the students.
- Hot water facility and hygienic surroundings are available for hostel students.
- Library with more than 21000 books, journals and internet facility is available.
- Spacious classrooms with necessary ventilation, playground, multi-purpose hall and auditorium are available.
- Lab facilities are available for knowledge and skill development.
- Rest rooms are available for women and men.
- Purified drinking water facilities have been made available for the students in college and hostel.
- Students have internet facility throughout the campus.
- We have constant plans to develop our facilities and infrastructures to make the environment conducive to learning and development of the students.

2. How does the institution cater to the diverse learning needs of the students?

- (i) Computer literacy (ii) yoga training (iii) Spoken English (iv) Remedial English (v) handwriting classes and (vi) personality development programmes are conducted.
- Special Coaching classes, Value Added Courses, Bridge Courses cater to the various diverse needs of the students.
- Special provisions have been made for the physically-challenged students for making them comfortable.
- Volunteers are roped in to help the visually-challenged in their studies and writing the records.
- Computer Literacy programme, SUPW and Handwriting Classes are conducted.

3. What are the activities envisioned in the curriculum for student teachers to understand the role of diversity and equity in teaching learning process?

During teaching practice the trainees meet learners with mixed abilities such as low achievers and high achievers. This kind of exposure leads them to have enough experience to understand the role of diversity and equity in teaching learning process. The activities include:

- Celebrations of national festivals, conducting sports & games, cultural activities and competitions, Action Research Programs.
- Action Research programs.
- Practical sessions in approaching various sections of society during teaching.
- Student teachers study about the individual differences of learners as a part of their curriculum.
- In addition, they are exposed to the different types of disadvantaged learners in the characteristics of children with special needs.
- Equal opportunity centre conducted short term courses to create awareness about children with disabilities, learning disorders and retardation problem. They were taught about the materials, methods, technology and approaches tailored to suit the needs of special children.

4. How does the institution ensure that the teacher educators are knowledgeable and sensitive to cater to the diverse student needs?

Teacher-educators update their knowledge by participating in seminars, conferences and workshop conducted by other colleges and universities.

Observing the activities of the teacher-educators in academic and extracurricular activities, obtaining Performance Appraisal Reports of the Teacher Educators and imparting necessary training programs etc. ensure that knowledge of the Teacher Educators remains up to date. Remedial programmes are designed to help the students who come from educationally and economically backward families. Through tutor-ward system, teachers learn about the problems of their wards and counsel them according to their needs.

- 5. What are the various practices that help student teachers develop knowledge and skills related to diversity and inclusion and apply them effectively in classroom situations?
 - Counselling is given to identify the psychological factors that influence learning process. Action research is carried out individually and in groups. Action research is done to study the problems of students. Case study record is maintained by the student teachers to record the details of particular students.
 - Students participate and present papers in seminars, conferences and workshops conducted by other institutions.
 - Micro teaching, practice teaching sessions and dissertation help the students to enrich knowledge and skills.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

- 1. How does the institution engage students in "active learning"? (Use of learning resources such as library, web site, focus group, individual projects, simulation, peer teaching, role-playing, internships, practicum, etc.)
 - The Practice of active learning is given importance. Activity based learning along with the traditional form of teaching method is followed in the class.

- 2. Library is immensely used by the trainees. To up-date themselves in the field of educational technology, CAI/CAL are used by the students.
- 3. Library is equipped with more than 21000 books, journals and CDs for learning.
- 4. Students are allotted library hour for reading books in the library.
- 5. Copies of research works and theses are kept in the library.
- 6. Back volumes of journals, encyclopedias, dictionaries are available for ready reference.
- 7. The College has subscribed to Inflibnet and students are given the passwords to access the books and journals in the Inflibnet.
- 8. There are computers in the library with internet facility.
- 9. The whole campus, including hostels, has internet facility so that students having laptops can access the internet for learning purpose.
- 10. Students are informed about the useful websites by the respective subject teachers for learning purpose. They are also asked to evaluate the websites in order to sensitize them about the various resources that are available at the click of the mouse.
- Individual projects on problems related to classroom are given to the trainees.
 Project and action research are given to students.
- 12. At M.Ed. level students are made to do research work. They are asked to select three topics out of which the university selects one topic.
- 13. At B.Ed. level, students are given individual assignments, individual case studies, text book evaluation, seminar topics, question paper setting etc.,
- 14. Simulation technique is used during micro-teaching. Team-teaching; Group-discussion, brainstorming and co-operative learning are the innovative methods for active learning. Computer assisted learning has been introduced. Facilities

- such as LCD Projector, OHP, Computer and Internet are being used for teaching and learning in the departments where such facilities are available.
- 15. The establishment of Language Laboratory has helped the students to keep pace with modern technology in learning process.
- 16. At B.Ed. level, 40 teaching days are spent in schools. Students teach two optional subjects supervised by guide teachers, and teacher educators. This macro-teaching period is proceeded by micro-teaching sessions spread over 8 days. Demonstration classes are also given by teacher educators.
- 17. Practicum components are included at B.Ed. level in the syllabus and they are clearly spelt out in each syllabus. The individual teacher takes care that students do all the components.
- 18. At M.Ed. level, too, students have field-based activities such as supervising 20 teaching hours of 5 B.Ed. students each. They also submit a report at the end. They also visit other college libraries, and university libraries for referring to related literature. They also visit schools and institutions to collect data.
- 2. How 'learning' is made student-centered? Give a list of the participatory learning activities adopted by the Institution and those, which contributed to self-management of knowledge, and skill development by the students?

Assignments and seminars are given for students to prepare the topics on their own.

The list of participatory learning activities adopted by the Institution are listed below:

- Preparing assignments
- Presenting seminar papers
- Preparing computer assisted instruction packages

- Projects/action research
- Co-operative learning

We have shifted to student-centred pedagogy with the active participation of students in project works, field trips, and discussions.

- 3. What are the instructional approaches (various models of teachings used) and experiences provided for ensuring effective learning? Detail any innovative approach/method developed and/used?
 - Technology is used to enhance learning
 - Students are encouraged to use technology for classroom instruction as well as preparation of learning material.
 - Students prepare PLM using PowerPoint slides.
 - Using PowerPoint presentation for students
 - Using OHP projector
 - Class Seminars
 - Action Research
 - Brain storming sessions are developed in our College to actively stimulate the students to participate in real time problem solving.
- 4. Does the institution have a provision for additional training in models of teaching? If yes, provide details on the models of teaching and number of lessons given by each student.

The trainees get more theoretical knowledge about the models of teaching that can be used in the classroom effectively in the core paper "Innovations in education" and in the optional papers.

Training is given in using concept attainment model. Five students are asked to demonstrate a lesson each to all the students. Discussion on the use of the model is held.

5. Do the student teachers use micro-teaching technique for developing teaching skills? If yes, list the skills practiced and number of lessons given by each student per skill.

Micro-teaching techniques play a vital role in B.Ed. training. Before the commencement of practice teaching, the students are given enough practice in this training technique.

The following micro-teaching skills are practiced by the trainees.

- Skill of introducing a lesson
- Skill of reinforcement
- Skill of stimulus variation
- Skill of probing questions
- Skill of using blackboard
- Skill of demonstration
- Skill of illustrating with examples.
- Skill of explaining
- Skill of achieving closure.

Two lessons were given by each student in each skill.

6. Detail the process of practice teaching in schools. (Lessons a student gives per day, lessons observed by the teacher educators, peers/school teachers, feedback mechanism, monitoring mechanisms of lesson plans, etc.)

Lessons given per day : Maximum of 4 lessons per day

7. Describe the process of Block teaching / Internship of students in vogue.

Practice teaching is considered as internship in the B.Ed. course. After getting permission from CEO for Government Schools, and Coimbatore Corporation Education Officer, students are allotted to different schools in and around Coimbatore for 40 days.

Before going to schools, students are taught the skills of writing instructional objectives, lesson plan, making teaching aids, drawing pictures, preparing charts and flash cards, working models etc. At schools each student-teacher has a guide teacher who is present in the classes taught by the student-teacher. Even, teacher- educator observes three lessons of the student-teacher. At schools also the student-teachers observe the classes of senior teachers.

They participate in all activities of the school. They conduct tests and interpret the scores. They also conduct psychology practical and case study.

8. Are the practice teaching sessions/plans developed in partnership, cooperatively involving the school staff and mentor teachers? If yes give details on the same.

Before practice teaching the trainees are sent to the respective schools to get the syllabus with the consultation of guide teacher. The teacher educators guide the trainees in preparing lesson plans and give corrections for the same. During practice-teaching the school teachers and teacher educators give suggestions to improve the methods and techniques of teaching.

9. How do you prepare the student teachers for managing the diverse learning needs of students in schools?

Counselling is given to cater to the special needs of the children. Various case studies are discussed before the commencement of practice teaching. This orientation

helps the teacher –trainees to identify and solve the problems of trainees with different learning needs. Schools identify educationally backward children. They are entrusted to the care of the teacher-trainees for intensive coaching in the subjects.

10. What are the major initiatives for encouraging student teachers to use/adopt technology in practice teaching?

Marks are allotted for preparing teaching practice aids. We stress that learning could be effective only with the help of teaching aids. No lessons should be taught without an aid.

2.4 Teacher Quality:

1. Are the practice teaching plans developed in partnership, cooperatively involving the school staff and mentor teachers? If yes, give details.

The mentor teachers help teacher-trainees to prepare lesson plans. During practice teaching the school teachers give suggestions to improve the methods and techniques of teaching.

2. What is the ratio of student teachers to identified practice teaching schools? Give the details on what basis the decision has been taken?

16 schools have been alloted for practice teaching by the CEO and the Coimbatore Corporation commissioner. All the 125 trainees are divided according to the needs of the schools and subjects. As per the directions given by the Chief Educational Officer and the Commissioner of the Corporation Schools, schools are alloted for the trainees. The ratio is apporoximately **8:1**.

Describe the mechanism of giving feedback to the students and how it is used for performance improvement.

An observation schedule is attached with every lesson plan. The observations by the guide teacher and the mentor teacher are given immediately. Oral instructions are also given. During the subsequent visits, teacher-educators monitor the improvement of the student-teachers.

M.Ed. students also observe the classes of the B.Ed students in schools and give their feedback.

4. How does the institution ensure that the student teachers are updated on the policy directions and educational needs of the schools?

An introductory talk about various schools in which students are going for teaching practice is given. Before the commencement of teaching practice student teachers are given adequate information about the school activities and curriculum framework. Proper intimation is given to the head of the schools regarding the particulars of the trainees, and then the trainees are sent to the schools to get the syllabus for their practice teaching in consultation with mentor and head of the school.

In the inaugural session of the placement interview, students are apprised by the heads of various schools of the needs of their schools. In addition, as a part of their curriculum they study about various types of schools. This helps the trainees to get updated on the policy directions and educational needs of the schools.

5. How do the students and faculty keep pace with the recent developments in the school subjects and teaching methodologies?

Faculty members attend seminars to update themselves. Faculty in turn inform the students about the innovations in the respective subjects of the trainees. The educational journals in the library are immensely helpful to the trainees to know the recent trends in the methodologies of teaching. Block Resource Teachers (BRT's) of SSA are invited for conducting workshop on innovative teaching methodologies like ALM. In this workshop student-teachers are trained to write lesson plans and update their knowledge in ALM.

6. What are the major initiatives of the institution for ensuring personal and professional/career development of the teaching staff of the institution (training, organizing and sponsoring professional development activities, promotional policies, etc.)

The faculty are encouraged to participate in state level and national level seminars, conferences and in workshops. They are also encouraged to contribute articles to the journals. The institution also organizes seminars at national level and state level. They are asked to apply for projects.

7. Does the institution have any mechanism to reward and motivate staff members for good performance? If yes, give details

The Head of the Institution as a democratic leader appreciates the achievements of the staff in the open meeting and in the council meetings.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:

1. How are the barriers to students' learning identified, communicated and addressed?

(Conducive environment, infrastructure, access to technology, teacher quality, etc.)

Tutorial system is followed in the institution. Therefore, it is easy to identify the personal and psychological problems of students. The solutions for the problems are given in counselling session.

The university insists on the original work of the M.Ed. students as far as their research work is concerned. During viva-voce examination, these students submit their manuscripts, proof for the data collection, and proof for school visits or institution visits.

2. Provide details of various assessment /evaluation processes (internal assessment, midterm assessment, term end evaluations, external evaluation) used for assessing student learning?

There is provision for both internal and external assessment.

For B.Ed.

- ➤ Internal assessment =20%
- > External assessment=80%
- ➤ Unit Tests/sessional tests
- > Assignments
- Seminars
- ➤ Model Exams

So the progress is assessed methodologically and periodically.

3. How are the assessment/evaluation outcomes communicated and used in improving the performance of the students and curriculum transaction?

The test papers and assignments are evaluated and feedback is given as soon as the tests are over. During the seminars the trainees are given immediate feedback. Thus, the performance of the student is improved.

4. How is ICT used in assessment and evaluation processes?

ICT is not used in assessment and evaluation procedures. However, it is used for analysis purpose.

Students are encouraged to submit their assignment to their respective teachers through email.

2.6 Best Practices in Teaching -Learning and Evaluation Process:

1. Details on any significant innovations in teaching/learning/evaluation introduced by the institution?

- LCD is used for teaching. The faculty members prepare learning materials using PowerPoint and present in the class. Educational CDs are used in the classroom.
 Students are also trained to prepare learning materials using PowerPoint
- Course file is prepared by concerned teachers.
- Students are asked to submit the assignments or research chapters.
- 5 marks are allotted for attendance to avoid absenteeism.
- All the B.Ed. students are asked to do 5 activities related to their elective subjects.
- B.Ed. students are offered 5 elective subjects on first come first served basis.

- Students are given the freedom to study either in Tamil medium or in English medium.
- Students are issued the passwords to access Inflibnet and WIFI connectivity is available throughout the campus.
- Classroom discussions, debates, group discussions are encouraged to give freedom of expression.
- For M.Ed. theory papers, only external evaluation is conducted. For thesis evaluation,
 50 marks are awarded by the internal and external examiners during viva-voce examination and 150 marks are awarded by the external examiner who evaluates the thesis.
- To avoid repetition and to encourage originality in the selection of research topics,
 the University selects one out of three research topics submitted by the students.
- Each day M.Ed. students visit the library during the library hour and each day they meet the guide to discuss the progress of their research.
- Permission is sought from the libraries of other universities to enable the students to do reference work.
- M.Ed. students are allotted 5 B.Ed. students each so that during the practice teaching period they supervise 20 periods of their teaching. They give feed back after observing their lessons and maintain a record for the field work.
- To avoid monotony in the selection of the topics, the students are encouraged to do case studies, ethnographic studies, experimental research, content analysis and qualitative research in addition to descriptive/ quantitative research.

2. How does the institution reflect on the best practice in the delivery of instruction, including use of technology?

Using OHP, LCD and PowerPoint enhances learning output. Preparing PLM packages and seminar papers using PowerPoint slides has helped the students to initiate using education technology. This motivates the students to be creative.

The Coimbatore Corporation provides the Siruvani drinking water supply to the college campus and for the hostel. In addition there is a bore well in the college campus to maintain uninterrupted water supply to the College and Hostel. The College has enough furniture and equipment.

Optimal Utilization of Infrastructure:

LCD Projector is available in all departments. A desktop computer with internet facility, audio facility and printer is provided in all staff rooms so that teachers can access information and prepare PPT's using multimedia.

Students use computers for preparing power point presentations .They also prepare digital lesson plans. Student-teachers download relevant pictures for their lessons.

Our Institution offers the elective guidance and counseling at B.Ed. level in order to prepare them for their future role as teacher.

- ➤ Every day classroom prayer is made compulsory for B.Ed. and M.Ed. students where they give English speech, Tamil speech, Thirukural, mini quiz and everday news so that they have no stage-fear.
- ➤ Each faculty members acts as an academic counselor for 15 students each and continuously follow the students' performance.
- ➤ LCD Projectors are available in seven classrooms and interactive boards are available in three classes. Students are given training to use them.
- > Students are encouraged to prepare digital lesson plans and PowerPoint presentations.
- > Students are given training to prepare simple and effective teaching aids.
- ➤ Competitions in many skills are conducted so that students identify their own hidden talents.

Many schools want teachers whereas our students who are graduates desire either to pursue higher education degrees or to take up teaching jobs nearer to their homes.

No. As all the students go to corporation and government schools, generally there is no opportunity in those schools. However, our students take extra classes if the school headmaster requests them.

- Institution provides staff, computers and telephone for the functioning of placement cell.

5.2 Student Support:

1. How are the curricular (teaching- learning processes), co-curricular and extracurricular programmes planned, (developing academic calendar, communication across the institution, feedback) evaluated and revised to achieve the objectives and effective implementation of the curriculum?

Curricular, co-curricular programmes as laid by the university are planned by the staff council. Important dates are noted in the college calendar. Internal Test dates and other dates such as the dates of citizenship camp etc are read to the students through circular and displayed on the notice-board.

Extra-curricular activities are planned by the College Council and the College Union. At the end of every academic year the institution gets students evaluation about

the teachers, academic programmes, students' union activities and about extension activities. Since the course is only for 10 months the suggestions are carried out during the next academic year.

2. How is the curricular planning done differently for physically challenged students?

Physically challenged students get inclusive education. They get additional assistance from the other students and volunteers. They listen to the recorded lessons. They take notes in Braille form and refer the Braille formatted notes which is available in our college library. Readers' allowance and remuneration for scribes are given.

3. Does the institution have mentoring arrangements? If yes, how is it organised?

The tutorial system is in vogue. Every staff will have 15 students as their wards. The tutor looks after the wards' problems, inside the college, inside the hostel, in their practicing schools and every member of the staff acts as a friend, philosopher and guide of their wards.

Every member of the faculty guides four to five M.Ed. students to complete their dissertation.

The effectiveness of the faculty in teaching is increased by their participation in seminars, conferences, refresher courses and workshops.

Yes. For low achievers we give personal and psychological counseling, and take special classes for them. Students who achieve low in practice teaching are given extra sessions.

Advanced learners take active part in seminars and discussions. Challenging topics are given to them.

b) Slow learners.

Remedial teaching with additional notes is provided for the slow learners.

All the members of the staff through the tutorial system render guidance and counseling services to the students about personal, family and academic problems.

Guidance is given to M.Ed. students to prepare for competitive exams such as NET/SLET/TET.

9. What is the grievance redressal mechanism adopted by the institution for students? What are the major grievances redressed in the last two years?

Grievance Redressal Cell functions at the institution. Grievance Redressal boxes are fixed at two places and the students are free to put forth their grievances in writing. Everything is kept confidential and immediate action is taken to redress the stated grievance. Installation of Wi-fi connectivity, provision of computers for working on the dissertation were the important steps to redress the grievance of the students during the last 2 years. Mess contractor was changed to provide better food for students.

10. How is the progress of the candidates at different stages of programs monitored and advised?

In Practicum:

B.Ed Students are monitored during Microteaching, Macro-teaching, Citizenship camp, Teaching aid preparation and in their Extracurricular activities.

In Theory:

Three Tests, one model exam and two Assignments are given in the B.Ed. course for an academic year.

For M.Ed. students their dissertation work is monitored in every step from topic selection to till their submission. Research colloquiums are conducted to assess their progress. M.Ed, students write two tests, two assignments and a model examination, Students' progress is discussed at the staff meeting.

11. How does the institution ensure the students' competency to begin practice teaching (Pre-practice preparation details) and what is the follow-up support in the field (practice teaching) provided to the students during practice teaching in schools?

B.Ed. students have micro teaching practice for 10 days. The pre-requisite for macro-teaching is thus fulfilled. Orientation is given by the subject teacher in preparing the lesson plan and teaching aids. The students attend two demonstration classes in each subject given by teacher-educators and experienced school teachers. In practicing schools the guide teacher will carry out necessary corrections. Teacher-educators also supervise the student – teachers during practice-teaching and give their suggestions to strengthen their teaching competency.

Teacher-educators also supervise the student-teachers during practice-teaching and give their suggestions to strengthen their teaching competency.

They are instructed to prepare suitable teaching aids and other resources for teaching.

A separate attendance register is maintained by the school and the Headmasters monitors the student –teachers.

At present Teachers Recruitment Board is empowered to recruit the staff. Salary and service conditions are fixed by the UGC. Appointments for teaching posts are made by the State Government following UGC/NCTE norms. TNPSC recruits non-teaching staff. The Directorate of Collegiate Education gathers data from colleges regarding the vacancy positions and the Higher Education Department notifies to TRB.

6. What are the criteria for employing part-time/Adhoc faculty? How are the part-time/Adhoc faculty different from the regular faculty? (E.g. salary structure, workload, specializations).

Part –time faculty are called as "guest lecturers". The principal is the head of the Selection Committee. Out of the applications received from prospective guest faculty, the committee selects the guest lecturers based on merit. They do not receive UGC scale of pay. They are ousted of the end of the academic year.

For professional development the institution allows the faculty to attend seminars conferences, workshops and refresher courses. They are encouraged to participate in academic activities such as presenting papers and publishing papers.

Separate rooms are given to the faculty. Adequate furniture, fans, lights, computer, printer, WIFI connectivity are provided.





Endowment:


